Who we are

The Asylum Seeker Resource Centre (ASRC) is Australia's largest human rights organisation providing support to people seeking asylum. We are an independent not-for-profit organisation whose programs support and empower people seeking asylum to maximise their own physical, mental and social well being. We champion the rights of people seeking asylum and mobilise a community of compassion to create lasting social and policy change. The ASRC movement is proudly supported by a community of committed volunteers and supporters.

We began as a TAFE project in 2001, when Kon Karapanagiotidis, then a teacher, discovered that people seeking asylum were living in the community with virtually no basic support. This led to the creation of a student-run and community funded Foodbank which was launched from a tiny shop in Footscray with only a few boxes of food. That same year, the ASRC was established on 8 June 2001.


As an independent, community-led organisation, the ASRC is in a unique position to advocate for the human rights of people seeking asylum, free from the pressures of government or the private sector. For this reason, the ASRC has been able to take a leading position in the opposition of Australia's asylum seeker policy, while offering alternatives to issues faced by people seeking asylum and refugees.

Today we are the largest independent human rights organisations for refugees and people seeking asylum. Our work on the frontline with people seeking asylum informs our practise and enables us to effectively advocate for and alongside

people with lived experience.

We offer more than 40 holistic programs that protect people seeking asylum from persecution and destitution, support well-being and dignity, and empower people to advance their own future.

We are proudly owned and run by our community and supported by a network of more than 1,000 volunteers and 100 staff in assisting around 6,000 people seeking asylum each year.





Having the freedom to determine our own futures is a blessing many of us take for granted, but something that the ASRC strives to make possible for refugees and people seeking asylum in our community every day. Giving a gift in your will to the ASRC is a powerful, compassionate way to help us continue this important work and to ensure the future dignity, freedom and independence of people seeking asylum in our community.

The growth of this organisation and movement for human rights since 2001 is an astonishing testament to the power of community and to the shared values of justice, integrity and respect for others upon which the ASRC is founded.



I wouldn't still be here if it wasn't for counselling. I've remembered all the things you taught me and I'm using it to help other people in my new job.



Beka* is not alone in struggling to enter the Australian workforce while seeking asylum. In 2016 she arrived from Papua New Guinea with professional qualifications as a secondary school teacher, which are not recognised here. The barriers to employment can quickly add up, such as a lack of local experience, cultural discrimination and limited English. These contribute to extreme financial hardship and a loss of independence, purpose and identity. Due to her visa restrictions, Beka is not eligible for the TAFE course that would mean her qualifications are accepted. Beka was referred to our ASRC Cleaning social enterprise in 2017. She began cleaning homes before moving to an opportunity in commercial cleaning. A staff member at a commercial client, Western Program Alliance, observed Beka's initiative and commitment. She was offered paid work experience in operations and, just a few weeks in, secured an ongoing full-time role in the administration team.

Frequently Asked Questions

Can a gift in my will make a difference?

Absolutely. A gift in your Will of any size plays a vital role in ensuring the ASRC can continue to protect, support and empower people seeking asylum so they can advance their own futures.

What kind of gift can I give in my Will?

There are four types of gifts you can give in your Will:

Residual

∰ Preferred Gift

A residual gift is a portion of your estate, or the balance remaining after your loved ones and expenses are provided for. This is the best type of gift, and one we prefer supporters to consider because it maintains the relative value of your gift and automatically adjusts to changes in the value of your estate

Pecuniary

A pecuniary gift allows you to give a specific amount of money to the ASRC.

Percentage

A percentage gift allows you to choose a proportion of either the residue of your estate, or your entire estate, to the ASRC.

Assets

An asset is considered anything of value, such as property, shares, jewellery or works of art. We would accept the property or asset with the understanding that we would seek to sell it and liquidate the assets to fund our programs. This type of gift, while valued, incurs further costs and liabilities to the ASRC.

The ultimate goal of the ASRC is to one day close its doors, why should I leave a gift in my Will?

While we hope the ASRC won't be needed forever, the needs of people seeking asylum don't just end once they are granted refugee status. We promise to remain agile and innovative in addressing the needs of refugees and people seeking asylum, allowing them not just to survive, but to thrive.

Can I choose what my gift is used for?

We request that gifts are left to us free of prescriptions so that the ASRC has the freedom to dedicate the gift to where it is needed most. Such a decision is made by the ASRC Management team.

Who should I tell about my gift in my Will?

Once you have consulted your solicitor and included the ASRC in your will, we suggest discussing your decision with your family and loved ones. This will ensure they understand and support your reasons for choosing to help the ASRC in such a powerful way. Once you have remembered us in your Will, please let us know. You don't have to tell us, but we would love the opportunity to thank you and welcome you as a Champion of Freedom.



Suggested Wording

If you already have a Will but would like to leave a bequest to the ASRC, you can do so by making a simple addition to your existing Will. Your lawyer can help you do this - this is called a 'codicil'.

If you do not have a Will you can simply include the type of bequest that you want to make to the ASRC when you write a new Will.

Once you have chosen the type of gift you wish to give, take this slip with you and speak to your legal advisor to draft the appropriate clause. To ensure your intentions are followed, it is important to word your Will to reflect this. The suggested wordings for each type of gift are set out below:

Residual

I bequeath to the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre Incorporated (ABN 64114965815) the whole of the residue of my estate to be for purposes that it shall determine, and this bequest will be free from all duties. The receipt of this bequest by any authorised officer of the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre or successor organisation, shall form a valid discharge to my Executor.

Pecuniary or Percentage

I bequeath to the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre Incorporated (ABN 64114965815) the sum of \$______/ or percentage of my estate (complete as appropriate) to be used for purposes that it shall determine, and this bequest will be free from all duties. The receipt of this bequest by any authorised officer of the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre or successor organisation, shall form a valid discharge to my Executor.

Asset

I bequeath to the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre Incorporated (ABN 64114965815) property or asset / freehold/leasehold property situated at and comprised in Certificate of Title No______ (complete as appropriate). I direct my Trustee to sell said property and I bequeath the net proceeds of the sale to Asylum Seeker Resource Centre Incorporated to be used for its work as decided by their management team The receipt of this bequest by any authorised officer of the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre or successor organisation, shall form a valid discharge to my Executor.
